## IDA hands over solar lighting system to Igarra General Hospital.

It all began on 20<sup>th</sup> November, 2023, when Elder P. K. Moses passed by the Igarra General Hospital and found a pervading darkness at the hospital. He branched to the hospital and did a video which he posted on the IDA platform. Members were very angry with what they saw. It was estimated that N5 million will give the hospital solar light. At 11pm, Arc. Paul Alaba Lawani started the "Lighting Up Igarra General Hospital with Solar Electricity" fund raising campaign on the IDA WhatsApp platform. Three days later, the fund had surpassed the target through an anonymous donation of N3 million. From then on, Elder Moses and his technical team worked tirelessly on the solar lighting project.

The solar lighting project was successfully completed and handed over on 12<sup>th</sup> December, 2023. The handing over ceremony took place at the Hospital Board

Room. Present at the occasion were: the IDA President, Dr. Dele Yaya; the Medical Director Dr. Bello Rhema Eruanga; Dr. Victor Apeji; the Matron, Mrs. Abubakar and staff of the hospital. On the IDA side we had Elder P. K. Moses, Paulson Alaba Lawani, Azebani J. S. Obende, Mrs. Bose Tom, Mrs. Nancy K. Yaya, Miss Osuashi Otaru and other members of the community. The NTA crew covered the ceremony.

In his address, the IDA President thanked God Almighty for the feat. He then requested that the Government of Governor Godwin Obaseki should immediately upgrade the Igarra General Hospital to the status of a teaching hospital. He also requested that the urgent needs identified by the Healthcare Sub Committee of the IDA Sustainable Development Programme Planning Committee such as the water supply system, doctor's quarter, access road, power supply, dysfunctional equipment and instruments, Igarra Continued on page 3

#### **Extracts from IDA 2023 annual progress report**

#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

This is the first annual progress report since the current IDA executive took over on 20<sup>th</sup> August, 2023. This report covers the period August to 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023.

#### 2.0 ACHIEVEMENTS

- In the period under review, the Association was able to record the following achievements:
- 1. Successful inauguration, handing over and swearing in of a new Executive Committee at a ceremony held at Dabom Hotel, Igarra on 20<sup>th</sup> August, 2023.
- 2. Setting up a 61-member IDA Sustainable Development Programme Planning Committee to prepare a 7-year 2024-2030 Development Plan for Igarra that the Association will implement.
- 3. Setting up a 40-member Consultative Committee.
- 4. Review of the IDA Constitution.
- 5. Paying congratulatory visits to the newly elected LGA Chairman of Akoko Edo Local Government, Barr. Tajudeen Alade Suleiman and the newly Consecrated Bishop of Akoko Edo Diocese, Rt. Rev. Ebenezer Omeiza Saiki.
- 6. Enquiry visit to the Igarra Branch Manager of BEDC Electricity PLC by IDA Delegation.
- 7. Introducing online registration of members.
- 8. Ensuring decorum in the IDA platform.
- Publishing the maiden edition of the IDA Newsletter and successfully launching it.
- 10. Writing letter to His Excellency Governor Godwin Obaseki on the rehabilitation of the

- damaged Igarra township roads with pictures and videos attached.
- 11. Submission of the SDPP Sub Committee Reports.
- 12. Installation of multi-million naira solar lighting system at Igarra General Hospital.
- 13. Installation of 80 solar street lights facilitated by Prince Clem Agba, former Hon. Minister of State for National Planning and Budget.
- 14. Filling vacant positions of IDA Welfare Officer and Provost Marshall with Mrs Eunice Obajaja and Charles Damisa respectively.
- 15. Constructing a befitting Signboard for the IDA Secretariat.
- 16. Compiling an authentic list of online registration and each member's annual dues payment from 2016 to 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023.
- 17. Improvement in the collection of members annual dues and regular updates on payment of dues and donations.

## 3.0 ONLINE REGISTRATION AND PAYMENT OF DUES

An analysis of the online registration and annual dues payment from inception in 2016 to 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2023 is reported below:

- 1. 361 persons are currently on IDA Platform as at 11<sup>th</sup> January, 2024.
- 192 have so far done the online registration as at 8<sup>th</sup> January, 2024
- 3. 270 members have so far registered and/or paid at least one year's annual dues.
- 4. 90 persons on the IDA Platform did not do online registration and have never paid even one *Continued on page 5*

security, fencing, staff shortage, perimeter fencing should be given urgent attention, noting that the IDA is willing and ready to partner with stakeholders in addressing these challenges. He added: "For every donor project, ownership and buy-in is critical. The challenge facing projects like these is making them remain in good serviceable condition during their life time."

The Medical Director of the Hospital, Dr. Bello in his remarks stated that in his career, he had never seen a community that value and cherish its General Hospital like

Solar Power Supply donated by Igarra Development Association Igarra (IDA) to General Hospital Igarra, Edo State."

In his advice to the staff of the Hospital on the appropriate use of the solar lighting system, Elder Moses explained that the surfaces of the solar panels will need to be cleaned regularly especially during this harmattan period. He emphasized that the system must be used for lighting only and not for heavy equipment such as pressing iron, boiling ring or kettle, etc. He advised the Hospital to select a staff that will be trained to maintain the system. He also noted that the existing solar installation in the

reduced the expenditure. The balance from the fund generated from the solar project will be used for the reticulation of water from the borehole to the hospital. The next project will be the rehabilitation of the Igarra General Hospital Doctor's Residence.

The Igarra General Hospital is very dear to our people. That is why the IDA has, from inception, taken the hospital and healthcare as its pet project. The Association has at various times donated to the Igarra General Hospital: a 15 KVA generating set, a multi-million Naira Anaesthetic equipment, and an Ambulance, apart from getting NYSC Medical Health Professionals













the Igarra community. He then enumerated the various assistance the Hospital had received from the IDA and other bodies. He thanked the IDA for its continuous support and commitment to the Hospital. The Resident Doctor, Dr. Victor Apeji was very happy for the successful delivery of the project and assured that this gesture will improve the services of the hospital to the community. The Matron similarly expressed her joy and requested that a Nursing School be sited in Igarra to supply the critically needed personnel. A Letter of Appreciation dated 12<sup>th</sup> December, 2023 from the Edo State Health Management Board was written to the IDA to "express our profound gratitude in appreciation for the hospital dedicated to the Laboratory needed repair and could be made to serve far more than its current capacity, adding that IDA was prepared to assist if the NGO that installed it would permit.

This project is unique in very many respects. From the spontaneous manner it was conceived, to the generous funding by members of the Igarra Development Association, and meticulous and transparent execution of the project, we see that nothing can stop us if as a collective we are committed to sponsoring and executing projects that will lift up our community. The items were got at dealers price which drastically

(including Doctors and Pharmacists) to complement the General Hospital staffing. It also organized free eye test and surgery for the inhabitants of Igarra and has given out 1000 eye glasses. In September/October 2023, the Healthcare Sub Committee of the IDA Sustainable Development Programme Planning Committee embarked on the following projects: installation of two anaesthetic machines, ceiling mount operating theatre lamp, big and small suction machines, two mobile operating theatre lamps, big and small autoclave machines, and filling of two big and three small cylinders with oxygen.

#### **IDA Newsletter comes on stream.**

The need for a news medium to inform the public about the vision, mission, activities, achievements, challenges, plans and proposals of the Igarra Development Association could not have been more felt than now that Association is poised and re-engineered to fulfil its mandate. The Newsletter is expected to serve as a critical vehicle for carrying out the sustainable development agenda of the Association.



It was therefore a welcome news that within 50 days of the inauguration of the new Executive, the maiden edition of the IDA Newsletter was born. On 10<sup>th</sup> October, 2023, the first e-copy of the Newsletter was released. This was immediately reviewed on the 13<sup>th</sup> October, 2023 and posted on the IDA Platform. Members of IDA were free to transmit to friends and well-wishers and to other groups they belonged to without permission.

Each medium has its advantages and limitations. To reach the various segments of our target audience, we need a mix of media. In realization of this, the IDA Executive approved the production of the print copy of the newsletter. On 22<sup>nd</sup> October, 2023, five hundred copies of the newsletter were delivered by the printer. At the first meeting of the IDA Newsletter Editorial Board at the IDA Secretariat, Igarra, the printed copies were unveiled. Board members were elated and wished it will be sustained. It was decided that the newsletter be launched virtually. While it is intended that

the IDA Newsletter venture will be self-funding and be revenue generating, it was necessary to do the launching to provide seed money for the project. While sale of hard copies cannot be immediate, income from adverts will take time to become substantial.

On 5<sup>th</sup> November, 2023, the virtual launching of the newsletter took place on the IDA Whats-App Platform. Members were excited and sent their good will messages. Comments included: "laudable, sign of good things to come"; "a great initiative borne out of a purposeful leadership"; "this is stupendous milestone achievement"; "taking Igarra to a new dawn"; "very innovative and will positively impact in creating awareness about the activities of IDA and Igarra generally"; "communication is a move towards development, this light will not be deemed, but glow"; "what a good start! Impressive! Well done"; and "great initiative. I hope it will be sustained and used as a medium to preach unity and promote progress".

In his welcome address at the Virtual Launching, the IDA



President noted that doing launching virtually had its challenges. He explained that the newsletter will be a veritable instrument for awareness creation, mobilizing support, seeking funding, publicizing IDA activities, receiving feedback, carrying out advocacy, promoting values, products and services as well as promoting the peace, progress and overall development of Igarra. According to him, "as is common



practice, we intend to organize other activities around the newsletter such as IDA Annual Awards, Creative Writing Clubs, Inter-school and Youth Competitions, etc." He emphasized that the Newsletter belongs to all and contributions in form of news, reports, articles, pictures, research, recipes, riddles and jokes, stories, poems, counseling, etc were welcome. There is need for adverts of members' events, products, and services. However, contributions must promote the peace, unity, progress and development of Igarra and its environs.

The launching kicked off on 5<sup>th</sup> November 2023 and continued indefinitely. The response was simply amazing. As at 9<sup>th</sup> December, 2023, the sum of N1,315,000 had been realized. The IDA Exco and Editorial Board wish to thank most sincerely all who donated to this project. Donors are assured that the fund will be judiciously utilized and the accounts rendered accordingly.

- 5. 73 have paid at least one year's annual dues but have not done online registration.
- 6. 16 members are financially cleared up to 2023. The analysis by year of joining IDA is as follows: 2023 (8), 2022 (2), 2021 (1), 2020 (1), 2019 (1), 2018 (1), 2017 (1), 2016 (1).
- 7. 3 members have paid for 2024.

251 members are owing at least one year's fees.

The breakdown: 51 owe 1 year, 25 owe 2 years, 33 owe 3 years, 24 owe 4 years, 29 owe 5 years, 39 owe 6 years, 38 owe 7 years and 12 owe 8 years.

If the 251 paid their outstanding dues as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2023, it will amount to N12,944,000 (twelve million, nine hundred and forty-four thousand naira only). We encourage members to pay their current and outstanding dues.

#### **4.0 CHALLENGES**

The major challenges facing the Association are:

- 1. Delay by some members in doing the online membership registration that commenced on 24<sup>th</sup> September, 2023. There are still many persons in the IDA WhatsApp group that have not done the online registration. We want to plead with them to do so without delay.
- 2. Also we need to embark on serious membership drive. Having just about 200 active members when we are targeting 1,000 is not encouraging. Every member must take it as a challenge to bring in more members.
- 3. Payment of annual dues has greatly improved within the period. However the backlog of N12,944,000 (twelve million, nine hundred and forty-four thousand

naira only) needs to be addressed.

- 4. The delay in change of signatories led to the use of two members bank accounts for the launchings and fund raising. We are happy to note that we are now at the final stage of effecting the change.
- 5. Nearly all the Sub Committees of the Sustainable Development Programme Planning Committee have submitted their Report. Implementation can pose a huge challenge unless concerted effort is made. We must see the execution of the Plan as a collective responsibility.

#### 5.0 COMMENDATION

Worthy of commendation is the high sense of patriotism displayed in the two occasions that we had to do fund raising. On each of it, we performed beyond expectation. The Executive is particularly grateful for this show of confidence and commitment to change the narrative. On our part, we will not disappoint the Association and its members.

Also to be praised is the high level of commitment shown by the Chairmen, Vice Chair persons and Members of the 2024-2030 IDA Sustainable Development Programme Planning Committee and Sub Committees. They displayed a very high sense of responsibility and produced a workable roadmap for addressing the pressing challenges facing our fatherland. The critical challenge is how to implement the recommendations so as to achieve the Igarra that we want.

We also want to put on record the valuable contributions of the Board of Trustees and the Consultative Committee. The current IDA Executive has within the period under review also put in its best.

The mere conviviality and

comaraderie in the IDA WhatsApp group gladdens our heart.The warmness with which we receive news of promotions, birthdays, awards, and other celebration by members is most commendable and should continue. Indeed the decorum exercised in the various debates that come up from time to time is highly commendable. Let us keep it up.

Above all, we thank God Almighty for the peace, progress and security that was achieved in 2023. We pray that 2024 will be a far more successful year. Amen.

## 80 solar street lights installed across Igarra

During a visit to his bosom friend, Chief Edi Lawani on 19<sup>th</sup> August, 2023, during the Irepa/Aba Festival, the former Minister of State for Budget and National Planning, Hon. Prince Clem Agba, intimated the audience that received him that he had facilitated some projects in the 2023 Federal Government Budget for Akoko Edo and Edo North. Since he was no longer there, he hoped that the projects appropriated would see the light of day.

Provision and installation of 80 solar



street lights was one of the projects. It was successfully completed on 16<sup>th</sup> December, 2023. The IDA ensured that they were not concentrated in one location but was spread across Igarra. Elder P. K. Moses, working on behalf of IDA, assisted in keeping custody of the items before installation. He also made available his truck to take them round to the spots which included: Alh. #### **Legend of Kukuruku Hills and other stories**

(Extracts from review of Onize Edith Aiyede's Kukuruku Girls: Tales of My Childhood)

In her late thirties to early forties, Ms. Aiyede tells her story through the eyes of a youngster and not as an adult. It is just perfect because writing as an adult would have resulted in an unbalanced publication. For one, an adult may be prone to unnecessary embellishments. But from the very first chapter of the story to the last, the author lays it bare for readers, the good and the bad, warts and all.

Take the author's encounter with a stubborn goat which she recounts in Chapter Two. Of course, anyone who has had a run in with domestic animals in rural areas will readily identify with Aiyede's story. Undisturbed by predators, goats get to throw their weight around sometimes, merrily scooping mouthfuls of grains left to dry on the ground, grabbing yam tubers when your back is turned. Under such circumstances, confrontations between humans and beast become inevitable. The author had more than enough with Aya the evil goat.

On one occasion, looking to revenging a past misdeed by the author, Aya waited until one day she was in the convenience. Assuming the classical bovine charge, the goat rammed the author from behind straight on her mess.

What is remarkable about Kukuruku Girl is the sense of rusticity readers feel all through: the swim in the village river, fetching water from the local spring and encountering reptiles and fish you were forbidden to kill.

Some of them were near tragic incidents. As she tells it, the author had gone to swim with some of her friends and relations. Her older sister was almost insultingly washed away by a fast-flowing current.

As expected, there is a chapter devoted to Kukuruku Hills, how she survived adventures there. "I lived the most adventurous part of my childhood away from my parents and siblings," Ms. Aiyede confesses. "Mud houses were



built at the foot of the hills. I remember looking long at them and scared they might fall and crush the buildings and every unlucky being in them. But that never happened, still hasn't, and probably never will."

Fascinating as the decrepit structures were to the author, it was the hills that caught and riveted her attention most. In time, friends started calling her "rock monkey" because of the "hide and seek in caves, rock climbing" she was fond of.

This is what Ms. Aiyede has availed readers, a close look at some of the incidents she personally went through in her younger years. As such, it should read as a bio. Instead, the author offers us a rich tapestry of her lived experiences in short, captivating stories.

Being a woman, you could also say she is a myth buster, questioning some of the cultural practices and beliefs common with the people of Igarra. For instance, why are women barred from watching night masquerades but not the ones who display in the daytime? She even probes further: why are adults always right and children wrong even though it is sometimes blindingly obvious that adults themselves really do not know it all?

Those are questions readers are bound to find unsettling in Kukuruku Girl but no answers to. Nearly 200-pages long, the collection comes complete with translations of Igarra words and usages into English, for easy understanding by non-native readers.

Wowed by the publication, a reviewer has described Kukuruku Girl as a "candid delivery of experiences which were fun and tragic at some point while revealing other aspects which were mischievous and humbling."

## The Office of the President and Vice President

- Give annual report to the house during Annual General Meetings. Chair all Executive Committee Meetings, and any other meeting where he is a member.
- 5. Be the primary spokesman of the Association and may delegate same to the Publicity Secretary or any other Executive Committee Member as he deems fit..
- 6. Be a signatory to the Bank Account of the Association.

- 7. Appoint appropriately qualified persons to various Committee positions that exist or may be created in the Association from time to time.
- Have power to take immediate action in the event of any emergency.

#### **B. VICE PRESIDENT:**

Qualification:

The Vice President shall have same qualifications required for the office of the president as specified above.

Functions and Duties:

- Perform the function of the President in an acting capacity in the absence of the President.
- Assist the President in the performance of his function and in the administration of the Association.
- 3. Perform such other functions and duties as may be assigned to him/her by the President.



My ancestral home, Igarra is one of the most interesting places on earth. Located at the foot and outer fringes of the Kukuruku hills in Edo State and bounded by exotic greens and heavy boulders, it is one cool, serene place with temperate and clement weather all year round.

The Igarra people are largely related by blood and marriage. The community is still very close knit because of that. This has been likened to intertwined 'beanstalk' (orupeza) by the erudite Prof. Adebayo Akerele of the University of Benin in a most elucidating lecture delivered in Igarra in April 1998 to mark the Igarra day celebrations of that year. The average Igarra family is connected to the other in more ways than one.

A most interesting aspect of the structure is the Anda/kindred/clan family system (that is a group of families descended from a common paternal ancestor, the families could either be large or small, extended or nuclear). The 'Anda' system consists of 14 existing families. In this 'Anda' system, members of the same 'Anda' may not be strictly related by blood yet they are forbidden to marry. They see themselves as brothers and sisters.

A few days ago, a colleague and classmate at the great research University of Benin in the mid 1990's recalled how we were in the faculty buildings at Ugbowo campus one day and I started squinting my eyes and craning my neck at the sound of a certain whistle and he asked if that whistle meant anything to me and I replied that whoever was whistling is an Igarra person. He found that very fascinating. Every son and daughter of Igarra knows and uses this whistle. In the Igarra heritage, that is the 'Chao'

(Hello) phenomenon.

The Igarra man has a great affiliation with his homeland. He may journey across seas and mountains. He may make distant lands his new abode but he carries Igarra in his heart always. He will return at every opportunity to commune with the land of his birth during the Easter and Christmas season and at cultural festivals for which the Igarra people are famous. The Igarra man reveres the cultural festivals of "Irepa", "Aba", "Ekuochi", "Echetete", "Aazi" ceremony amongst others.

The Igarra man, wherever he is comes home for the 'Aba' festival, which draws crowds from all over Nigeria, the rest of Africa, Europe, America and Asia. From the four corners of the world will come many Igarra families and their friends and well wishers. The ceremony which is celebrated every Seven years has become a huge tourist attraction and of immense economic benefits to Igarra and its environs. In the same vein, the Igarra man prepares for and participates in the Ekuochi, Echetete, Azi and other festivals with brio and gusto as I wrote elsewhere.

Igarra has rich family, cultural and social ties that should bind us together. The Igarra people freely marry across family and religious divide. We go to the same farms and markets. We drink from the same streams and fountains. We educate our children in the same schools. We live in the same homes and we take ourselves in outside Igarra. We help ourselves across family divide to find our feet in foreign lands. We are nothing but brothers when we step out of Igarra; at least we used to be so!

If all this is so why should the structure of "anda" which should be a great fabric weaving our society together become an albatross wrapped around the neck of the Igarra people especially at home? Why should an otherwise good thing like the "Anda" phenomenon in Igarra divide rather than bind us together? No one chooses the family into which they are born. God in his all knowing grand design places us in families so we can care for and comfort one another in the course of life. If a man did not choose his family why should we then blame him for his family?

As I posited elsewhere what I see from the way Igarra society is structured is that:

"Igarra has all it takes to be a great town, the careful and delicate structures in place is to aive the town and its people strong communal base and a sense of public duty. Igarra's sons and daughters have made good progress at home and abroad, their clout permeates all aspects of our national life and human endeavour both in the public and private domain (science, medicine, law, engineering, finance, arts and the social sciences). It is not for want of human resources or persons who can make things work that Igarra remains poor as many of our people are erroneously led to believe. At every material time in history, the Igarra's have always had and will always have such people but this will only translate to common good if the people apply and address their minds to it. Today is the right time; the Igarra people must jettison old praxis, find a new way of doing things".

In the final analysis and whatever we say or do, we must know that we have only one place to call home, whatever heights we attain in life, we can never, ever divest ourselves from Igarra. Let these words of Martin Luther King Jnr. be a constant reminder of what you owe yourself, others and Igarra as an Igarra man:

"every man must decide whether he will walk in the light of creative altruism or the darkness of destructive selfishness. This is the judgment; life's most persistent and urgent question is what are you doing for others?"

I ask you today, what are you doing for Igarra?

#### **INTRODUCTION**

I, Mr. Daudu Benjamin Obajuobalo, an indigene of Igarra and the pioneer Curator (Head) of the newly established National Museum in Ojah, Akoko-Edo Local Government Area, am pleased to present this cultural institution to the Igarra Development Association. This museum, the first of its kind in Edo-North, holds significant importance for its proximity to Igarra, the local government headquarters.

The establishment of this museum is a result of collaboration between Rt. Hon. Peter Akpatason and the management of the National Commission for Museums and Monuments. It stands as a purpose-built museum highlighting the culture, tradition, technical prowess, and economic contributions of the people of Ojah and Ekpedo to Edo state and the nation at large. Officially commissioned on December 7, 2022, its presence is expected to boost tourism, particularly for the culturally rich Akoko-Edo and Edo-North, which boast numerous heritage sites. This could potentially lead to the recognition of the IREPA/ABA FESTIVAL of Igarra as a World Heritage Festival by UNESCO, with the support of the National Commission for Museums and Monuments.

#### LOCATION AND HISTORY OF OJAH

Ojah, where the museum is located, is the fourth largest community in the southern part of Akoko-Edo Local Government Area, approximately 27 kilometers from Igarra. It is nestled among the Afemai (Kukuruku) Hills, bordered by Okpella in the East, Ososo in the North-East, Makeke in the North, and Ojirami to the South-West. Known for its lowlands and uplands, Ojah's fertile soil and abundant clay deposits have made pottery and farming the primary occupations. Like other communities in Akoko-Edo, Ojah boasts

a rich cultural heritage, including the Festival of Initiation into Adulthood.

## MISSION AND SIGNIFICANCE OF THE MUSEUM

The mission of the National Museum in Ojah is to systematically collect, preserve, study, and interpret both tangible and intangible aspects of Nigeria's cultural heritage for Nigerians and those in the Diaspora. #### The Role of Diasporas in Achieving Sustainable Development in Igarra

The Diaspora community has become relevant and accorded important recognition by the Federal Government of Nigeria stemming from the creation of the Diaspora Committees in the National Assembly and the subsequent establishment of the Nigerian Diaspora Commission by the immediate past government, intending to harness the knowledge and cascading impact of the diasporan community in Nigeria development.

The United States Agency for International Development USAID noted that an engaged Diaspora community drives development and defined the Diaspora as a term of selfidentification used by a community of people who live outside a shared country of origin, ancestry, or affinity, but maintain active connections with it. More than 20 million Nigerians (about 10%) of Nigerians are global diaspora members living in every continent. With roots around the world, these communities are uniquely positioned to amplify and sustain Nigeria' growth.

The Nigeria Diasporas play key roles in every sector of Nigeria and have to a large measure helped Nigeria as a nation with the much-needed inflow of foreign exchange, medical experts, entrepreneurs, and academicians to name a few. They are involved in medical missions providing specialized treatments, surgeries, and medical devices to diagnose and treat diseases. Also, they are involved in all sectors of the Nigerian economy including entrepreneurship, modern farming, involvement in value addition in the food chain, IT, manufacturing, etc.

Diaspora remittances to Nigeria based on the last figure indicate an inflow of \$24 billion annually. Certainly, this figure does not reside only in Lagos but is unevenly distributed among states and largely the major cities. This implies that even Diasporas' remittances are contributing to the development of the cities and filtering down to the rural communities to shore up economic activities in those areas which may curb the rural-urban

exodus of youths.

Igarra community is not left out in having their illustrious sons and daughters as part of the vibrant Nigeria Diaspora community making waves in various fields. To name a few, we have Prof. Momoh, a recipient of the American National award; Dr. Tony Akande (Pharmacist and entrepreneur) who once led the Afenmai community in the US; Dr. Rex Ajayi (Urologist); Dr. John Dimowo (Aesthetic physician); Dr. Kingley Jademi (Drug development); and Dr. Charles Jagun (regulatory intelligence) who once led the Igarra community in the US and current leader of Akoko-Edo intelligentsia group to name a few. These Etuno Diasporas have contributed immensely to the development of Igarra in various ways including corporate social responsibility, housing, agriculture, academics, scholarships, security, medical missions, etc., despite the lack of coordination from on ground.

With this insight into the potentials inherent in the Diasporas and in particular with the highly placed Anetunos in the diaspora, Igarra and associated organizations cannot wait for other individuals or groups to develop the community nor the insensitive state government, rather all Etuno stakeholders must be involved and Igarra Diaspora is a ready source to tap from in achieving Igarra sustainable development in terms of business investment, manufacturing and infrastructure as enunciated by Dr. Nasiru Kadiri at a recent Investment Summit in Igarra. As previously indicated, the Igarra Diasporas has made attempts to set the development agenda rolling but often faced a myriad of challenges that have hindered a full-throttle contribution to the lifting of Igarra from the current state of neglect and underdevelopment by successive Edo State Governments to the desired direction of sustainable development. Of note is that despite the uncoordinated approach of the diasporan in making a difference, they have injected millions of dollars directly and indirectly into all sectors of Igarra life that are visible in Igarra.

#### Soon, degrees without skills will be useless - JAMB registrar

The Registrar of the Joint Admission and Matriculation Board, Professor Ishaq Oloyede, has urged Nigerian youths to seek demonstrable skills as a means of survival, warning that very soon university degrees would no longer be the sole guarantor in the job market.

Oloyede gave the advice on Thursday while delivering the convocation lecture at the Kwara State University, Malete.

He delivered a lecture, titled: "Learning, Unlearning and Relearning – Prerequisites of the Digital Age."

The JAMB registrar said, "New opportunities will emerge in the high-tech sector and many skills that were not otherwise taught in conventional schools would be needed. Degrees would no longer be the sole guarantors

of jobs but demonstrable skills will.

"In this regard, there won't be meaningful difference between the literates and the illiterates without the cutting-edge skills that are associated with the triad — learning, unlearning and relearning."

Oloyede stressed that: "Those who can learn, unlearn and relearn are the successful ones and those without the mindset that accommodates the triad are bound to perpetually lament."

While noting that today's world was different from the Stone Age, the JAMB registrar noted that: "One of the factors responsible for this change is the totality of what makes the information age, which is still evolving as technology develops rapidly.

"The onus of the responsibility lies on everyone to get prepared for the challenges of the information age by taking lifelong learning seriously and being willing to change as the circumstances unfold."

The acting Vice Chancellor of KWASU, Prof. Shaykh-Luqman Jimoh, had earlier in his address expressed optimism that the lecture would broaden the horizon of the audience.

"Our educational institutions must become catalysts for transformation, preparing our graduates not just for the challenges of today, but for the rapidly evolving landscape of the digital age," the VC said.

## Join the Urban Farming Population

Urban farming is the practice of vegetables such as waterleaf and cultivating crops in the city or residential areas. Traditionally, our largely agrarian forebears had the backyard gardens, called ubazi, in addition to their remote farmlands, where they went for their relatively extensive cropping of major cash and food crops like cocoa, cassava and yams. At the ubazis, they cultivated vegetables like okra, waterleaf, efo, ugwu, tomatoes, pepper etc for the family immediate supplies.

As land spaces became tight and unavailable, the ubazis gradually disappeared.

With the ever-increasing population, soaring costs of food items, and increase in knowledge, urban farming has emerged as a new innovation to address these challenges. In Nigeria, and especially with the scare of herdsmen menace and kidnaping, urban farming is becoming a compelling option towards sustaining production of some food crops.

One of the methods of urban farming easily practiced by everybody, young, old, students, working people and retirees is the sack or bag farming. It is a do-ityourself system, at a minimum to no-cost outlay, requiring just as little as a space for a cement bag, even on a concrete floor. The only essential space requirement is openness to sunlight for the growing plant. A single such sack farm can yield enough green

peppers for a family of four for 6 to 9 months of repeated harvesting, without waiting for the rains. What a fantastic occupation for the retiree or elderly at home and for students that would like to engage in pastime earning venture!

What are the materials needed and 3. how does one start?

#### **Materials Needed**

- 1. One or more empty cement or flour bags
- 2. Topsoil, preferably loamy soil 5. from a nearby bush or farmland, not roadside sand.
- 3. Dried cow or chicken manure.
- 4. Desired seeds, seedlings or plant stems.
- 6. Water



#### **Procedure**

Select a suitable location:

- Choose a spot that receives sufficient sunlight and offers protection from heavy rain or wind.
- 2. Clean the grow bag: If using a cement or flour bag, clean it thoroughly to remove any remnants.
- Mix the soil and manure, in a ratio of 3:1.
- Fill the bag to at least 18 inches of soil depending on the crop
- Sow the seeds, at least 2 per cement bag, depending on the crop type. Holes could be perforated at the side of the bags and waterleaf stems inserted.
- Water the mix: Moisten the soil without saturating it. Avoid waterlogging.
- 7. Secure the bag from free ranging animals that might eat up or destroy the plants.
- Water the soil regularly and avoid drying up of the plant.
- 9. Consult for further assistance in case of any issues.

Urban farming is one of the most rewarding pastimes that everyone can engage in, regardless of location or type of residence. With some creativity and ingenuity, people living in storey buildings could as well cultivate vegetables wherever there is sunlight. A sizable plastic container will yield amazing results as well. Replace that flower pot with a pot of lettuce
